THE MARIST BROTHERS OF THE SCHOOLS:
OUR TEACHERS

All of us are aware of the fact that Marist High School operated by the Marist Brothers of the Schools. We know what they look like and how they teach. Few of us are aware of their purpose and origin as a teaching order in the Church.

The Marists were founded by Blessed Marcellin Champagnat, a devoted parish priest, who was born in France in 1789. One day, he was called to the home of a dying teenager who was unaware of the basic teachings of his faith.

After having prepared this young man to appear before his God, Father Champagnat realized the utter lack

of Christian education among the young people of France and vowed to God and our Blessed Lady that he would do something specific to solve this problem. He founded a congregation of teaching Brothers whose purpose would be to lead youth to Christ through Mary.

Under the special protection of Mary, to whom he consecrated himself and his Brothers, Father Champagnat was able, before his death in 1848, to witness the growth of his Brothers of Mary throughout a large number of parishes in France.

Since its origin in 1817, the congregation has grown into the world's second largest order of teaching Brothers numbering in excess of ten thousand members. They are spread through fifty-eight countries.

The Marist Brothers are professional religious teachers. As religious, they strive for their own sanctification through the obser-vance of the vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience. As professional teachers, they are thoroughly prepared through years of study of study, to lead youth to Christ by operating Catholic schools.

The American Marists teach in twenty-eight schools in the United States and operate three colleges and eight high schools in their mission fields in Japan and the Phillipine Islands. The teaching apostolate of

the Marists in America is not limited to any one geographic area; they are found at work in the following dioceses: Illinois, New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Florida, Texas, West Virginia, and Georgia.

THE DEATH OF PRESIDENT KENNEDY COMES AS A SHOCK TO THE STUDENT BODY

The sad news of the death of Pre - sident John F. Kennedy came as a shock to the student body here at Marist High School.

Brother Pius, principal, announced the news to the faculty and students during the fifth period on Friday, November 22.

Shortly after the announcement of the tragic event, the student body recited the rosary for the repose of the soul of our youthful and energetic president, and to ask God's blessings upon our country.

At his inaugural address, the president said these famous words: "Ask not what your country can do for you. Ask what you can do for your country." He gave his service and life for his country.

We can only pray for the repose of his soul and prepare ourselves well while at Marist so that we too may be well equipped to contribute to our country and its future, for we are the future of America.
